

Jobs Decrease by 2,400 in June

The June jobs report revealed that Rhode Island's Total Nonfarm employment level of 513,200 was down 2,400 from the revised May employment level of 515,600. The job count is down 400 from a year ago.

Job losses were in the Accommodation & Food Services (-1,200), Private Educational Services (-900) and Health Care & Social Assistance (-700) sectors. Job gains were in the Other Services (+600) and Construction (+300) sectors.



Multiple Jobholders in Rhode Island

According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics' Current Population Survey, 5.9 percent of employed Rhode Islanders sixteen years and older held more than one job in 2024. This represented a 0.2 percentage point decrease from the state's 2023 rate.

Historical data show that Rhode Island's multiple jobholder rate consistently surpasses the United States average. In 1994, 5.9 percent of the nation's workers held two or more jobs, 0.9 percentage points less than in the Ocean State. This gap widened to 2.3 percentage points in 1999 and again in 2009. The gap now stands at 0.7 percentage points.

In 2024, the Ocean State had the twenty-fifth highest multiple jobholder rate in the United States. The highest rates were reported in Montana (8.3%), Nebraska (8.0%), Wisconsin (7.9%), North Dakota (7.8%) and Minnesota (7.8%) while Alabama (3.3%), Florida (3.6%), Mississippi (3.8%), Arkansas (4.2%), New Jersey (4.3%) and North Carolina (4.3%) had the lowest percentages of multiple jobholders in the country.

Within New England, Rhode Island (5.9%) had the lowest multiple jobholder rates in 2024. Maine's multiple jobholder rate of 7.0 percent was the highest in the region and was the tenth highest in the nation. Vermont (6.5%) reported the next highest multiple jobholder rate in the region, followed by New Hampshire (6.4%), Connecticut (6.1%) and Massachusetts (6.0%). Each of the six New England states reported multiple jobholder rates above the national average (5.2%).
