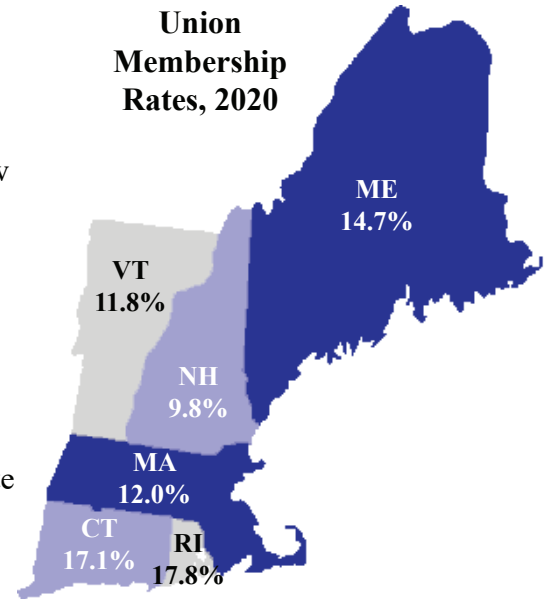


Union Membership in Rhode Island, 2020

According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS), 17.8 percent (81,000) of Rhode Island private and public sector workers were union members in 2020. This was up from 17.4 percent in 2019. The number of union members was 81,000, down 2,000 from 83,000 in 2019.

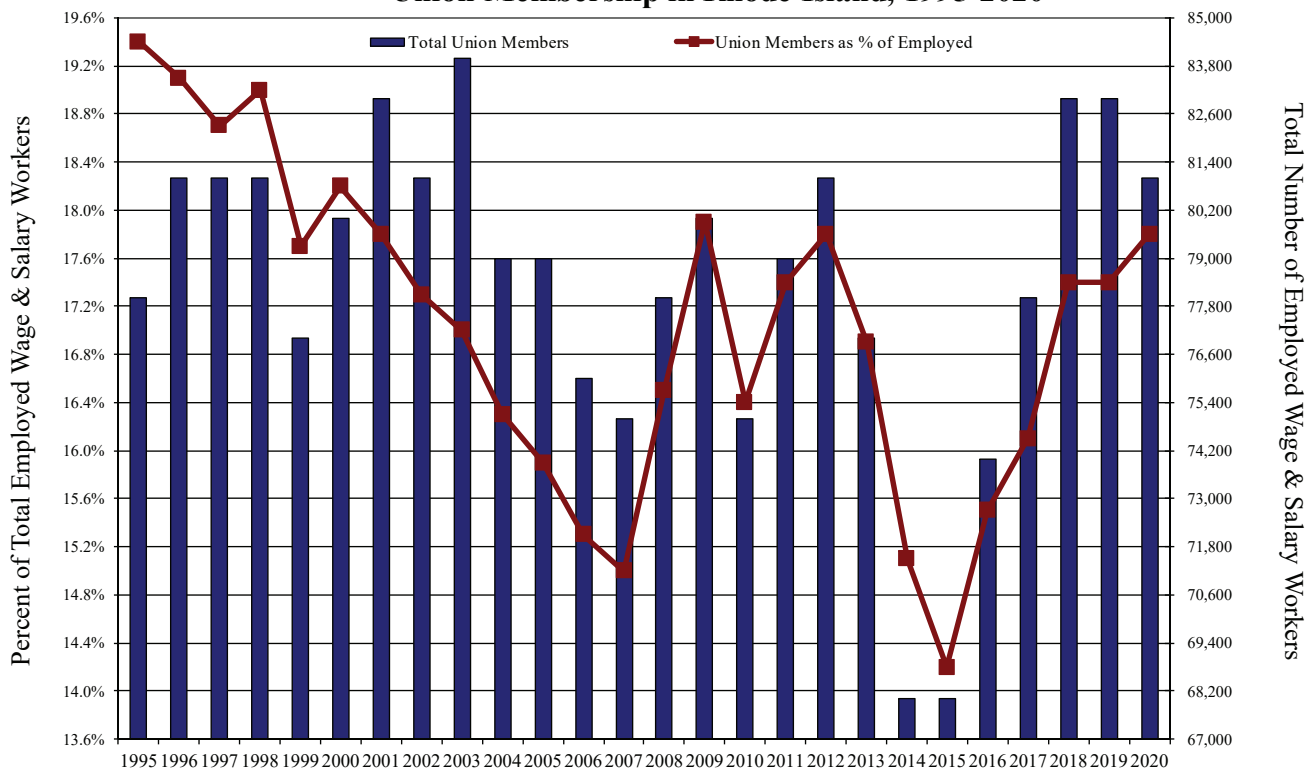
Nationally, the union membership rate was 10.8 percent in 2020, up half of a percentage point from 2019 and well below the 20.1 percent measured in 1983. Among the fifty states, Rhode Island reported the third highest union membership rate, trailing Hawaii (23.7%) and New York (22.0%). South Carolina (2.9%), North Carolina (3.1%), Utah (3.7%), South Dakota (4.3%), Tennessee (4.4%) and Virginia (4.4%) had the lowest union membership rates in 2020.

Regionally, Rhode Island (17.8%) had the highest union membership rate in New England, followed by Connecticut (17.1%), Maine (14.7%), Massachusetts (12.0%), Vermont (11.8%) and New Hampshire (9.8%). Only New Hampshire had a union membership rate less than the national average.



Union members and workers whose jobs are covered by a union or employee association contract represented 12.1 percent of the nation's wage and salary workers and 19.1 percent of Rhode Island's wage and salary workers.

Data included within this report is derived from the Current Population Survey (CPS), a monthly survey of households conducted by the Bureau of Census for the Bureau of Labor Statistics. Union membership data refers to members of a labor union or an employee association similar to a union. Union representation data includes union members as well as workers who report no union affiliation, but whose jobs are covered by a union or an employee association contract.
