
Unemployment Insurance (UI) claimants represent an able and available supply of trained workers who are currently seeking work. Online postings represent a current demand for labor detailing the types of occupations employers are seeking to fill.



A comparison of these two data sets provides an indication of occupational groups for which labor supply is sufficient to meet employer's current needs and for which there is a shortage of trained workers available to meet employers' current demands.

On June 30, 2015, the Department of Labor and Training's EmployRI online network recorded 21,986 on-line job postings from RI based businesses. Also during June a total of 8,073 (24.0%) of the 33,000 unemployed RI residents collected UI benefits.

A comparison of the on-line job posting to the UI claimants currently seeking work indicates that there was less than one (0.4) claimant for each on-line posting.

Job postings for which the usual educational requirement was either a high school diploma (26.4%) or a bachelor's degree (15.6%) accounted for the most on-line postings, numbering 5,803 and 3,424 respectively. For nearly a quarter of the postings, an educational requirement was not listed.

The only labor surplus identified this quarter was associated with the Construction & Extraction occupational group. In this major group there were approximately two UI claimants with this type of work experience for every on-line posting.

Potential labor shortages were associated with postings for Healthcare Practitioners & Technical occupations, Computer & Math occupations, and Architecture & Engineering occupations where job postings outnumber claimants by more than ten to one. These numbers indicate that employers seeking to fill vacancies in these occupational groups would have more difficulty finding qualified workers than those employers attempting to fill vacancies in occupational groups where the ratio of unemployed claimants to on-line postings is greater or closer to one.

Labor Demand

On-line postings represent a current demand for labor, detailing the types of occupations employers are seeking to fill.

During the second quarter of 2015, EmployRI recorded nearly 22,000, on-line job postings for over 460 different occupations. There were 72 occupations with 50 or more job postings during the second quarter 2015 accounting for 43 percent of the on-line postings.

There were more postings than claimants for 29 of the 30 occupations most in demand, signifying the difficulty employers are having in finding experienced workers to meet their needs.

Listed below are the thirty occupations with the most job postings recording by EmployRI during the second quarter of 2015.

Labor Supply

Unemployment insurance claimants represent an able and available supply of trained workers who are currently seeking work.

The 8,073 individuals collecting unemployment insurance benefits in June 2015 reported previous work experience in more than 450 different occupations.

Labor surpluses existed for 16 of the 30 occupations most frequently sited by UI claimants. For 11 of these occupations, there were more than 2 experienced workers for every job posting, signifying the difficulty many unemployed workers are having finding work in occupations in which they were previously employed especially in the off season.

Labor Shortages

Some Rhode Island employers report that they are having difficulty finding qualified workers to fill many of the positions they have available. During the second quarter of 2015, the number of posted vacancies exceeded the number of unemployed workers for more than 250 occupations, indicating a possible labor shortages for those occupations.

Our labor supply and demand data indicates that there are not enough experienced unemployed workers available to meet the strong demand employers have for occupations in healthcare and computers.
