INTRODUCTION

State of the State – A Statistical Profile of Rhode Island’s Cities and Towns

From Burrillville to Block Island, from Woonsocket to Westerly, recent demographic and employment trends have impacted the lives of all Rhode Islanders. Incorporating information collected by the United States Department of Commerce and the Rhode Island Department of Labor and Training, State of the State depicts demographic changes and recent employment trends that have impacted our local economies over the last twenty years.

Population diversity based on age, sex, race, and ethnicity, as well as educational attainment, labor force statistics, and English language proficiency of local residents, is encapsulated in statistical profiles for each of Rhode Island’s thirty-nine communities. An overview of local private sector employment by industry sector is also provided on a city and town basis.

OVERVIEW

As of 2019, private job levels averaged 424,358, an increase of 36,534 (+9.4%) from the 2009 average and is now the peak private employment level. The unemployment rate is down 7.4 percentage points from 2009 to 3.6 percent. The state's population count stood at 1,057,231 in 2019, up 620 from 2018.

Thirty-one of the state's thirty-nine cities and towns reported total employment growth between 2018-2019, with Tiverton having the largest over-the-year increase (+15.1%). Cranston (-4.4%) posted the largest total employment decrease.

Providence establishments employed the largest percentage (23.3%) of Rhode Island private sector workers, followed by Warwick (10.5%), Cranston (7.0%), East Providence (4.8%) and Pawtucket (4.6%).

Twenty-five cities and towns gained residents, with Providence (+363), Cumberland (+232) and Lincoln (+185) adding the most people. Of the fourteen cities and towns that lost residents, only South Kingstown (-292), Newport (-245) and Bristol (-210) lost more than 200 residents.

Note: employed data included in this edition of the State of the State is pre-pandemic.

Rhode Island (3.6%) was tied for the 28th highest annual average unemployment rate in the country in 2019. Alaska (6.1%), had the highest rate in the country. The annual average unemployment rate for the United States as a whole in 2019 was 3.7 percent.

Rhode Island's total population increased by 4.5 percent during the 1990's, with the gain of 44,855 people, while between 2000 and 2019, Rhode Island gained 8,912 (+0.9%) residents.

Over forty-two percent (42.6%) of Rhode Island residents 25 years and older had a college degree (Associate or higher) in 2019. The share of state residents without a high school diploma or GED decreased between 2000 and 2019, falling from 22.0 percent to 11.2 percent.

Between 2009 and 2019, employment in Rhode Island increased by 37,029 (+8.3%) jobs. Private sector employers reported a gain of 36,534 (+9.4%) jobs, while public sector employment grew by 494 (+0.8%) jobs.



STATE OF RHODE ISLAND

The percentage of Rhode Islanders who spoke only English or spoke another language and English either well or very well increased from 94.7 percent in 2010 to 95.7 percent in 2019.

The percentage of total residents aged 18 to 64 that spoke Spanish while speaking English either not well or not at all decreased from 3.7 in 2010 to 3.3 in 2019, representing 25 percent of all Spanish-speaking Rhode Islanders.


The Health Care & Social Assistance (19.2%) industry sector employs the largest percentage of private Rhode Island workers, followed by Accommodation & Food Services (12.3%) and Retail Trade (11.3%).

Providence (98,987) had the largest number of private sector workers in the state, followed by Warwick (44,708) and Cranston (29,505). Foster (336) and Little Compton (639) had the fewest number of workers.

- Barrington's total population grew by 6.1 percent during the 1990's, with the addition of 970 people, however, between 2000 and 2019, Barrington lost 688 (-4.1%) residents.
- Almost 75 percent of Barrington residents 25 years and older had a college degree (Associate or higher) in 2019. The share of local residents without a high school diploma or GED decreased between 2000 and 2019, falling from 7.7 percent to 2.9 percent.
- Between 2009 and 2019, total employment in Barrington grew by 142 (+4.7%) jobs. Private sector employers reported a gain of 191 (+8.4%) jobs, while public sector employment decreased by 62 (-6.8%) jobs. In comparison, statewide total employment grew by 37,029 (+8.3%) jobs.
- Barrington's unemployment rate averaged 2.4 percent in 2019, tied for 3rd lowest in the state and below the state average of 3.6 percent.



- Bristol's total population grew by 3.9 percent during the 1990's, with the addition of 844 people. However, between 2000 and 2019, Bristol lost 324 (-1.4%) residents.
- Almost half (48.4%) of Bristol residents 25 years and older had a college degree (Associate or higher) in 2019. The share of local residents without a high school diploma or GED decreased between 2000 and 2019, falling from 25.9 percent to 12.5 percent.
- Between 2009 and 2019, employment in Bristol declined by 369 (-4.9%) jobs. Private sector employers reported a loss of 373 (-5.9%) jobs. Statewide total employment grew by 37,029 (+8.3%) jobs.

Bristol's unemployment rate averaged 3.2 percent in 2019, tied for 19th lowest in the state and below the state average of 3.6 percent.



- Burrillville's total population shrunk by 2.7 percent during the 1990's, with the loss of 434 people. Between 2000 and 2019, Central Falls added 792 (+5.0%) residents.
- Forty-one percent of Burrillville's residents 25 years and older had a college degree (Associate or higher) in 2019. The share of local residents without a high school diploma or GED decreased between 2000 and 2019, falling from 19.6 percent to 9.9 percent.
- Between 2009 and 2019, employment in Burrillville grew by 784 (+27.7%) jobs. Private sector employers reported a gain of 511 (+23.1%) jobs, while public sector employment increased by 273 (+12.3%) jobs. In comparison, statewide total employment grew by 37,029 (+8.3%) jobs.
- Burrillville's unemployment rate averaged 3.3 percent in 2019, below the state average of 3.6 percent.



- Central Falls' total population grew by 7.3 percent during the 1990's, with the addition of 1,291 people. Between 2000 and 2019, Central Falls added another 501 (+2.6%) residents.
- Almost 13 percent of Central Falls residents 25 years and older had a college degree (Associate or higher) in 2019. The share of local residents without a high school diploma or GED decreased between 2000 and 2019. While falling from 50.9 percent to 35.1 percent, Central Falls continued to have the highest percentage of residents without a high school diploma.
- Between 2009 and 2019, employment in Central Falls grew by 240 (+8.8%) jobs. Private sector employers reported a gain of 437 (+22.5%) jobs, while public sector employment decreased by 197 (-24.7%) jobs.
- Central Falls' unemployment rate averaged 4.5 percent in 2019, the third highest in the state and above the state average of 3.6 percent.








